The following info could save your life in a disaster. Please read and save this information regarding Teton County's Emergency Alert System (EAS):

OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS

- The sirens will be activated for a continuous 3 minute wail during an event that poses a threat to life and/or property for a significant portion of the population (i.e. wildfire, flood, tornado, hazardous materials spill, etc). **If you hear an outdoor warning siren, tune to NOAA All-Hazards Weather Radio or one of our local traditional Emergency Alert System providers (listed below) for information.** *Not every area of the county is covered by sirens!* For a map of siren locations, visit www.tetonwyo.org/em.



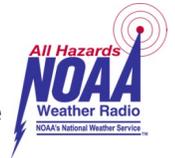
TRADITIONAL EAS PROVIDERS

- If you believe an emergency event is occurring, tune to one of these sources for information and instructions: NOAA All-Hazards Weather Radio, Optimum (Bresnan) Cable, KJWY TV 2, 93.3 FM, 95.3 FM, 96.9 FM, and 1340 AM. Other local stations also broadcast some EAS alerts.



NOAA ALL-HAZARDS WEATHER RADIO

- Teton County Emergency Management recommends that every home and workplace have a NOAA All-Hazards Weather Radio with alert function. These radios will automatically alert and turn on when emergency information needs to be relayed such as wildfires, evacuations, severe weather, AMBER alerts, floods, and more. These radios range in price from \$15 to \$40, and are available at many local retailers.



TEXT MESSAGE AND EMAIL

- Teton County Emergency Management will use the Nixle notification service during emergencies to send alerts via SMS text message and email. Sign up for free at www.nixle.com or by texting your zip code to **888777** today.

- Call **(866) 221-6441**. DO NOT call 9-1-1 during a disaster asking for information! 9-1-1 should be used for reporting emergencies *only*.
